Members of the Sauk County Board:

Thank you for forwarding me Resolution No. 28-08 relating to the distribution of Public Safety Interoperable Communications Grant Program (PSICGP) funds. I appreciate your concern and your feedback is well-received.

As you know, approximately \$15.4 million one-time PSICGP funds have been made available to the State of Wisconsin to ensure that our first responders have the tools they need to communicate and operate effectively. Recently, the Wisconsin Office of Justice Assistance (OJA) proposed to keep \$14.7 million of the funding to implement a statewide radio communications system.

As the Resolution emphasizes, several county boards have stood up in opposition to this proposal. Counties like Sauk maintain numerous responder units and the operational costs for police, fire, EMS, and communication systems are substantial. There is a valid concern that local governments may not be considered for funding if the majority of the PSICGP allotment is committed to a statewide, rather than a regional, plan.

I have spoken with several OJA officials and they have provided me with the reasoning behind the proposal. They maintain that a statewide approach will be a more functional, more manageable, and more evenhanded method of securing the state's interoperable communications systems.

The State Interoperability Executive Council (SIEC) found that borders (between townships, counties, regional public safety consortiums, etc.) have a negative impact on the effectiveness of communication systems. Accordingly, the statewide approach seeks to build capacity, reduce borders, and establish a unified, more manageable communications system that brings together personnel and assets from different agencies, regions, and states.

SIEC also found that the statewide approach won't create winners and losers as a regional or county-by-county approach would. Funding regional projects would create a competitive grant process that would leave some projects in the state unfunded, thus not meeting the requirement of PSICGP to "deliver capabilities that approach the functional equivalent of a common

standards-based shared system." Also, distributing funds based on a population formula would result in a disjointed collection of projects across the state and would likely be rejected by the Department of Homeland Security.

At the same time, it's important to note that the recent proposal has a long way to go before implementation. OJA is in the process of performing a six-month technical study that will determine how effective the statewide approach would be – and they have assured me that their proposal will not be finalized until the results of the study are reported. I'll be sure to keep tabs on this study and provide you with any updated information I receive.

Furthermore, OJA officials assured me that the PSICGP funding will pass through to local agencies, as the federal provisions require. Accordingly, OJA plans to draft Memoranda of Understanding which clarify and document the specific arrangements between OJA and local agencies. OJA and SIEC have clearly stated that no PSICGP expenditures will precede documented support of local agencies.

As an aside, OJA emphasized that the Homeland Security Grant Program will be making similar funds available in the near future and local agencies will be able to apply for assistance. If you have any further questions about the future availability of those funds, don't hesitate to contact me.

Again, thank you for forwarding me this Resolution and bringing this situation to my attention. I appreciate your vigilance and I encourage you to continue investigating and pressing this matter. Rest assured that I will continue to track this proposal and bring your concerns before the relevant players.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Village of Merrimac respectfully request that the Sauk County Board of Supervisors endorse and pursue the banking of the Rail Line for the purpose of Rails to Trails; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that upon the passage of this resolution, a true and accurate copy of this resolution shall be provided to all Sauk County Board of Supervisors and State and Congressional representatives elected to represent the County of Sauk, Wisconsin.

Dear Governor Doyle,

On behalf of many constituents, I request that you provide the leadership and action needed to resolve interrelated rail-to-trail and freight rail interests focused in Sauk County and having regional and statewide stakeholders.

You have the opportunity to greatly enhance Wisconsin's premier trail system with a continuous trail from Madison to LaCrosse, by completing the missing link of that trail in Sauk County. Trail advocates statewide see the potential and none are less enthusiastic for the trail's development than the community leaders and residents in the Villages of Sauk City and Prairie du Sac and the Town of Prairie du Sac (please see their attached joint resolution). Residents in Sauk Prairie have grown understandably frustrated as a state-owned rail corridor running through the three Sauk Prairie municipalities has sat unused for a decade. This situation is intolerable for residents of these communities.

In a related concern, the fate of hundreds of Wisconsin jobs depends on a rail bridge at Merrimac that was built in the late 1890's. Based on what is known of the bridge's condition, it is only a question of when the bridge will require major structural work to remain in service. This situation imperils thousands of jobs within the region.

Stakeholders for the interrelated Madison-Reedsburg rail line and Madison-LaCrosse trail concerns include the communities, workers and employers along the corridors, Executive Agencies of your administration including the DOT and DNR, and units of government from local to federal and the HoChunk Nation. Stakeholder interests include the community and economic development goals at the local, regional and state levels for manufacturing, agriculture, tourism and healthy lifestyles.

I respectfully request you designate a person from your administration to provide leadership to address and take action on these issues. People have been patient long enough for the completion of the trail and attention to rail concerns of vital interest to the economy.

People deserve to know the state shares their concerns and is willing to provide the leadership and action to achieve the goals of ensuring viable rail service for the long-term and proceeding with a Rails to Trails development that will be a vital asset to the Sauk Prairie area and to the state.

Dear Senator Schultz:

Governor Doyle has asked that I respond to your recent letter involving railroad lines in Sauk County.

Your letter addresses several issues. The rail line from Madison to Reedsburg that could potentially provide a corridor to connect with the 400 State Trail to complete a potential Madison to La Crosse trail is privately owned by the Union Pacific Railroad. Any use of the corridor for trail purposes would need Union Pacific Railroad concurrence.

The Department of Transportation has worked closely with the Pink Lady Rail Transit Commission since its creation in the Commission's efforts to work with Sauk County, Sauk County communities and shippers, the Wisconsin & Southern Railroad and the Union Pacific Railroad to increase business on the line and continue it as a viable private enterprise. Through this effort, service on this line has been maintained and the rail line serving Sauk County has been kept in private ownership, without the use of limited public funds. I believe this is a positive for the state. I hope that the businesses in Sauk County continue to support the rail service with their usage and that the line remains in private ownership.

The railroad bridge at Merrimac is located on the Madison to Reedsburg line owned by the Union Pacific Railroad. We have had no indication from either the Union Pacific Railroad or the Wisconsin & Southern Railroad, which operates on the line, that there are any structural concerns or problems with the bridge that cannot be addressed with routine maintenance.

The Union Pacific Railroad and the Wisconsin & Southern Railroad are eligible to use the state's rail assistance loan program if they were to need assistance with issues related to the bridge or the rail line. Program applications are scored competitively and ranked each year. Thus far, neither entity has submitted an application for any projects involving this line.

It is true that the railroad line in the villages of Sauk City and Prairie du Sac and the town of Prairie du Sac has been unused for railroad purposes since the bridge over the Wisconsin River at Sauk City was damaged in 1997. Because the line through the communities is currently unserviceable, rail service to the United Cooperative facility located north of Prairie du Sac, is dependent on use of the rail line through the Army's Badger Ammunition Plant.

The Sauk City/Prairie du Sac line was purchased by WisDOT in 1980 for the specific purpose of providing continuation of rail service. Until the state is able to secure an easement that will ensure the availability of rail service to the Co-Op using an alternate route following closure of the plant and transfer of the land, it is premature to convert the corridor to recreational uses.

The department is actively communicating with the General Services Administration (GSA) to reach agreement on the needed easement. We have been assured that the GSA desires to conclude the transaction by the end of the year.

The department has a history of working with communities desiring to place trails on state-owned rail corridors. There are several examples in Madison where trails are in place or under construction on currently used rail lines and those in a rails-to-trails status. I am confident that when the time is right, productive negations will occur.

ARTICLE V: OFFICERS

- 5.1 <u>Number of Officers</u>. The principal officers of the Corporation shall be the President, the Secretary, and the Treasurer. Such other officers or assistant officers as may be deemed necessary may be elected or appointed by the Board of Directors.
- 5.2 <u>Election of Officers.</u> The principal officers of the Corporation shall be elected by a majority of the Board of Directors.
- 5.3 <u>Eligibility.</u> Any Sauk County resident over the age of eighteen (18) is eligible to be an officer of the Corporation.
- 5.4 <u>Tenure.</u> Each Officer shall serve a two-year term, which shall be staggered. In order to first implement these staggered terms, the initial Secretary and Treasurer shall serve a one-year term and the initial President shall serve a two-year term. After that, the President shall be elected for a two-year term on even-numbered years and the Secretary and Treasurer shall be elected for two-year terms on odd-numbered years.
- 5.5 <u>Vacancy</u>. A vacancy in any of the principal offices because of death, resignation, removal, disqualification, or otherwise shall be filled by the Board of Directors.
- 5.6 <u>Removal.</u> Any officer or agent may be removed by the Board of Directors whenever in its judgment the best interests of the Corporation will be served thereby, but shall be without prejudice to the contract rights, if any, of the person so removed. An Officer must be removed by a majority of the Board of Directors. Election or appointment shall not itself create contract rights.
- 5.7 <u>Compensation.</u> Any decision to provide compensation for any Officer shall be approved by a unanimous vote of the Board of Directors.
- 5.8 The President. The President shall be the principal executive officer of the Corporation and, subject to the control of the Board of Directors, shall in general supervise and control all of the business and affairs of the Corporation. He/she shall have authority, subject to such rules as may be prescribed by the Board of Directors, to appoint such agents and employees of the Corporation as he/she shall deem necessary; to prescribe their powers, and duties; and to delegate authority to them. Such agents and employees shall hold office at the discretion of the President. He/she shall have the authority to sign, execute, and acknowledge, on behalf of the Corporation, all legal documents and/or instruments necessary or proper to be executed in the course of the Corporation's regular business or which shall have been authorized by resolution of the Board of Directors. In general, he/she shall perform all duties incident to the office of President and such other duties as may be prescribed by the Board of Directors from time to time.
- 5.9 The Secretary. The Secretary shall keep the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Directors. He/she shall see that all notices are duly given in accordance with the provisions of these Bylaws or as is required by law. He/she shall be the custodian of the Corporation records. He/she shall keep or arrange for keeping of a register of the post office address of each Corporation director and officer which shall be furnished to the Secretary by each director and

officer. He/she shall attest to acts of the Corporation authorized by the Board of Directors by attesting thereto and placing his/her signature below that of the President on any document which gives evidence thereof.

- 5.10 The Treasurer shall keep accurate accounts of all financial transactions of the Corporation and shall draw all orders on the treasury for such sums as is authorized by the Board of Directors. He/she shall have the charge and custody of and be responsible for all the funds and securities of the Corporation. He/she shall receive and give receipts for moneys due and payable to the Corporation from any source whatsoever and deposit all such moneys in the name of the Corporation in such banks, trust companies, or other depositories as shall be selected by the Board of Directors. If required by the Board of Directors, the Treasurer shall give a bond for the faithful discharge of his/her duties in such sum and with such surety or sureties so the Board of Directors may from time to time determine. At each meeting of the Board of Directors, he/she shall furnish a financial report concerning the corporation's funds. He/she shall, upon reasonable notice and at reasonable times, make available the books, papers, and accounts of the Corporation for examination by any member of the Board of Directors or the Sauk County Board of Supervisors. He/she shall in general perform all the duties incident to the office of the Treasurer and have such other duties and exercise such authority as from time to time may be delegated or assigned to him/her by the President or the Board of Directors.
- 5.11 Officers to remain in good standing. Members of the Board of Directors and officers of the Corporation shall assume their duties diligently and actively participate in meetings, conferences, committees and work groups to further the purpose of the Corporation.

ARTICLE VI: CONTRACTS, LOANS, CHECKS, AND DEPOSITS

- 6.1 <u>Contracts.</u> The Board of Directors may authorize any officer or officer's agent or agents to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument or deed in the name of and on the behalf of the Corporation, and such authority may be general or confined to specific instances.
- 6.2 <u>Loans.</u> No funded indebtedness shall be contracted on behalf of the Corporation and no evidences of such indebtedness shall be issued in its name unless authorized by a resolution of the Board of Directors. Such authority may be general or confined to specific instances.
- 6.3 <u>Checks, Drafts, etc.</u> All checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money, notes or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the Corporation shall be signed by such officer or officers, agent or agents of the Corporation and in such manner, including facsimile signature, as shall from time to time be determined by resolution of the Board of Directors.
- 6.4 <u>Deposits.</u> All funds of the Corporation, not otherwise employed, shall be deposited from time to time to the credit of the Corporation in such banks, trust companies or other depositories as the Board of Directors may select.

ARTICLE VII: PROHIBITED TRANSACTIONS

- 7.1 <u>Prohibited Transactions.</u> The Corporation shall not, and the directors or the officers or any of them shall not, have any power to cause the Corporation to:
- (1) lend any part of its income or corpus, without receipt of adequate security and a reasonable rate of interest, to;
- (2) pay any compensation, in excess of a reasonable allowance for salaries or other compensation for personal services actually rendered, to;
 - (3) make any part of its services available on a preferential basis, to;
- (4) make any substantial purchase of securities or other property, for more than adequate consideration in money or money's worth, from;
- (5) sell any substantial part of its securities or other property, for less than an adequate consideration in money or money's worth, to; or
- (6) engage in any other transaction which results in a substantial diversion of its income or corpus to;

any person who has made a substantial contribution to the Corporation, a brother, sister, spouse, ancestor or lineal descendant of such a person, or another corporation directly or indirectly controlled by such a person. Any transaction which violates the foregoing prohibitions shall be absolutely void as to the Corporation and the officers or directors who authorized or effected the same shall be jointly and severally liable in their individual capacities to revoke or rescind the transaction and to restore the Corporation, its income and corpus, to the condition prevailing before the transaction was attempted.

7.2 <u>Ethics.</u> The Directors and Officers of the Corporation shall be bound by Sauk Co. Code Ch. 36 (2007), entitled Sauk County Code of Ethics.

ARTICLE VIII: FISCAL YEAR

8.1 Year. The fiscal year of the Corporation shall end on December 31 of each year.

ARTICLE IX: AMENDMENTS

9.1 <u>Amendments.</u> These Bylaws may be amended only by majority vote of the Sauk County Board of Supervisors.

ARTICLE X: CORPORATE SEAL

10.1 <u>Seal</u>. The corporation shall have no seal.

ARTICLE XI: DISSOLUTION

11.1 <u>Dissolution</u>. The Corporation may be dissolved at any time by a two-thirds majority vote of the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, or otherwise as provided by law.

ARTICLE XII: EXPENDITURES AND CONTRIBUTIONS

12.1 Except for customary expenditures required by the day to day operations of the Corporation, all expenditures and contributions made by the Corporation shall be approved by a majority vote of the Board of Directors, provided that such expenditures or contributions are within the purposes of the Corporation.

ARTICLE XIII: INSURANCE FOR OFFICERS, DIRECTORS, EMPLOYEES AND AGENTS

13.1 <u>Insurance</u>. The Corporation may purchase and maintain insurance on behalf of any person who is or was a Director or Officer or employee or agent of the Corporation, against any liability asserted against him/her or incurred by or on behalf of him/her in any such capacity, or arising out of his/her status of such, whether or not the Corporation would have the power to indemnify him/her against such liability under the laws of the State of Wisconsin. Such insurance may, but need not, be for the benefit of all Directors or Officers of the Corporation.

In the event a Director or Officer or any employee or agent of the Corporation ("Indemnified Party") shall receive payment from any insurance carrier or from the plaintiff in any action against such Indemnified Party such Indemnified Party shall promptly reimburse the Corporation for the amount, if any, by which the sum of such payment by such insurance carrier or such plaintiff and payment by the Corporation to such Indemnified Party exceed such indemnified amounts; provided, however, that such portion, if any, of such insurance proceeds that are required to be reimbursed to the insurance carrier under the terms of its insurance policy shall not be deemed to be payments to such Indemnified Party under this Bylaw. In addition, the Corporation shall be subrogated to such Indemnified Party's rights against any insurance carrier with respect to such indemnified amounts and the Indemnified Party shall execute and deliver any and all documents and perform any and all other acts or deeds which the Corporation shall deem necessary or advisable to secure such rights. The Indemnified Party shall do nothing to prejudice such rights of recovery or subrogation. Such right of subrogation shall be terminated upon receipt by the Corporation of the amount to be reimbursed by the Indemnified Party.

BYLAWS OF THE SAUK COUNTY HEALTH CARE CENTER FOUNDATION, INC.

ARTICLE I: NAME

1.1 <u>Name.</u> The name of the Nonstock Corporation is "Sauk County Health Care Center Foundation, Inc.", hereinafter referred to as "Corporation".

ARTICLE II: AUTHORITY AND PURPOSE

- 2.1 <u>Authority.</u> The creation of the Corporation, by the filing of the Articles of Incorporation, is with the approval of and at the direction of the Sauk County Board of Supervisors. These Bylaws have been approved, adopted and enacted by majority vote of the Sauk County Board of Supervisors.
- 2.2 <u>Purpose.</u> The purpose of the Corporation shall be that which is stated in the Articles of Incorporation and to the extent consistent with those general purposes, the specific purposes of the Corporation shall be to solicit, hold, manage, invest, expend and raise funds and other donations and gifts for the maintenance, benefit, and support of the new Sauk County Health Care Center.

ARTICLE III: MEMBERS

3.1 <u>Members.</u> As provided in the Articles of Incorporation, the Corporation shall have no members.

ARTICLE IV: BOARD OF DIRECTORS

- 4.1 <u>Board of Directors.</u> The Corporation shall have a Board of Directors, consisting of three (3) persons.
- 4.2 <u>Eligibility.</u> To be eligible for appointment to the Board of Directors, one must be a member of the Sauk County Health Care Center Board of Trustees.
- 4.3 <u>Appointment of the Board of Directors.</u> The Board of Directors shall consist of the Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, and Secretary of the Sauk County Health Care Center Board of Trustees. The Chairperson, Vice Chairperson and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall also serve as the Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, and Secretary, respectively, of the Board of Directors of the Corporation.
- 4.4 <u>Compensation.</u> No Director shall receive compensation for services rendered to the Corporation.
 - 4.5 Powers and Duties. The Board of Directors shall:

- (1) Have exclusive control of the affairs and the funds of the Corporation and may require an accounting of said funds as it deems necessary. Failure of any officer to furnish such accounting shall be cause for his/her removal from office by a majority vote of the Board of Directors.
- (2) Have the authority to make such rules as it may deem necessary to conduct the affairs of the Corporation, provided such rules are not inconsistent with the Articles of Incorporation or the Bylaws of the corporation.
- (3) It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to keep a complete record of all accounts and corporate affairs and to present a statement. This duty incorporates Wis. Stat. § 181.1601 (2007) by reference.
- 4.6 <u>Regular Meetings.</u> The Board of Directors may provide by motion for regular meetings of the Board of Directors to be held at such time and such place as to be decided by the motion. The Chairperson of the Board of Directors shall call all the Board of Directors to order and shall act as chairperson of the meeting. The Secretary of the corporation shall act as Secretary of all meetings of the Board of Directors. The regular order of business shall be:
 - (1) Call to order.
 - (2) Adoption of Agenda.
 - (3) Approval of minutes of the previous meeting.
 - (4) Public Comment
 - (5) Treasurer's report.
 - (6) Reading of communications.
 - (7) Committee reports.
 - (8) Unfinished business.
 - (9) New business.
 - (10) Adjournment.

Unless, as otherwise provided in the Bylaws, all meetings will be conducted pursuant to Robert's Rules of Order.

All meetings of the Board of Directors shall occur only after reasonable notice in advance to all members of the Board and the officers of the corporation. Said notice shall be provided by the Secretary of the Corporation and shall include a reasonable indication of the matters to be considered or acted upon at the meeting.

- 4.7 <u>Quorum</u>. All of the Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the Board of Directors.
- 4.8 <u>Vacancies.</u> Vacancies on the Board of Directors shall be filled by the remaining Directors, consistent with the actions of the Board of Trustees of the Health Care Center in filling any vacancy on that Board.



Petition 6-2008 is a request by SWS, LLC c/o Jeff Schluter to establish a Planned Residential Unit Development (PRUD) according to Section 8.12 Sauk County Shoreland Protection Ordinance for the Lake View Estates Condominium Plat. The purpose of the PRUD is to seek approval for the location of recently built and proposed boathouses along the shoreline of Lake Wisconsin as part of the Lake View Estates Condominium Plat, the locations of which differ from the original location approved under Petition 21-2002. The land to be affected by the proposed PRUD includes:

A parcel of land being all of Lot 1 and part of Lot 2, CSM 4293 and part of Government Lot 2 and 3 and the SW ¼ of the NW ¼ and the SE ¼ of the NW ¼, Section 8, T10N, R7E, Town of Merrimac, Sauk County, Wisconsin.

See also Appendix B for a map of the area of the Lake View Estates Condominium Plat and locations of proposed and existing boathouses.

2. Information and History

Information

As described under Section 8.12 Sauk County Shoreland Ordinance, the purpose of the PRUD is intended to act as an overlay that, in this instance, allows for the relaxation of side yard setbacks for boathouses between pre-identified Limited Common Elements (LCE's). Specifically, the applicant is requesting that a zero lot line setback be granted for existing and proposed boathouses that share a party wall (common interior wall) between the following LCE's:

See also Appendix B for a map entitled, 'Boathouse Location Plan A' for a general plan view of all boathouse locations and 'Boathouse Details BH-1 through BH-8' showing a more precise location for each boathouse.

As stated under Section 8.12, a condition of all PRUD's would require the preservation of certain open spaces, preferably shoreland, in perpetuity. To fulfill this requirement, the applicant has agreed to limit the total number of boathouses to not more than those identified under this petition and as shown on Appendix A. In effect, this will fulfill the preservation requirement insofar that shoreland areas will not be encumbered by the construction of additional boathouses beyond those with which are identified under this petition.

History

July 23, 2002. The PZLR Committee approved Petition 21-2002 a preliminary plat for *Lakeview Estates Condominiums* with the condition that side yard setbacks be waived to facilitate the placement of boathouses on property lines between two lots with the intent that each affected lot utilize one-half of each boathouse. This approval also granted the applicant a total of 10 'double' boathouses to be shared between pre-identified LCE's. The location of each boathouse approved under this petition is shown under Appendix A as depicted on the original condominium plat. The original condominium plat was approved under *Chapter 22 Land Division and Subdivision Regulations Ordinance*.

March 27, 2008. The applicant submitted a development application to the Planning & Zoning Department requesting approval of a PRUD to allow for the relocation of boathouses in different areas other than the previously approved locations under the Petition 21-2002. This request is the result of a number of boathouses that have been built in unapproved locations as well as a desire by the developer relocate a number of not-yet-built boathouses. The total number of boathouses will not exceed 10, the same number originally approved under Petition 21-2002.

March 4, 2008. Planning & Zoning staff sent notices to adjacent and surrounding landowners notifying them of the PRUD proposal. Per *Section 8.12*, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources was also notified.

Spring 2008. Town of Merrimac action on the proposed PRUD is anticipated.


3. Issues and Consistency with Local Development Plans and Ordinances


Typically, when reviewing a develop proposals and changes in land use, staff looks at several criteria, including how the proposed use fits into the surrounding area, whether there are any constraints to development at the proposed site and if the proposed use is consistent with local and county development plans and ordinances. In this instance, this analysis was previously completed with the staff report under Petition 21-2002. It is recognized that the minor change in the location of the boathouses as part of this Petition remains consistent with any respective plans and ordinances.


4. Recommendation

In summary, the proposed PRUD adjusts the location of boathouses originally approved under Petition 21-2002. Approval of this Petition will limit the applicant to the number and location of boathouses noted under Appendix A, thereby preserving shoreland areas. Any future amendment to the number and location of boathouses will require the applicant to apply for a new PRUD to be considered by the PZLR Committee. Consistency with local development plans and ordinances is maintained and addressed under Petition 21-2002. The Town of Merrimac has not yet approved the PRUD as presented. Given this analysis, and with the recognition that the Town of Merrimac has not acted on the proposal, staff does make a recommendation that the Planning, Zoning and Land Records Committee **Postpone Petition # 6-2008**, a PRUD for Lake View Estates Condominiums.




