RESOLUTION #54 - 2024

Resolution Supporting Two-Year Campuses

Resolution offered by the Executive & Legislative Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: The State of Wisconsin and Wisconsin Counties have had a long and strong history of supporting two-year campuses throughout Wisconsin. Financial feasibility has put a financial burden on the UW-system due to declining enrollments and has forced the closure of campuses in Richland Center, Washington, Fond du Lac, Marinette, and Waukesha Counties. In 2018 Northstar Analytics reported the UW System and related organizations "produce and annual economic impact of over \$24 billion" while generating nearly 167,000 jobs and over \$1.1 billion in state and local taxes. A 2024 report written by James R. Johnson in research with the Berkley Center for Studies in Higher Education and Greenwood Asher & Associates reported America's university systems need to adapt to changing conditions and determine how to attain their educational goals through adaptive leadership who can leverage adaptive conditions to scale initiatives across systems. The Wisconsin Legislature earlier this year passed Senate Bill 518, which received bipartisan support in both chambers, to set aside \$20 million in state funds to provide up to \$2 million in grants to communities affected by UW system branch campus closures. The success of the remaining two-year campuses is vital to the economies of our local communities. Campuses similar to the UW-Platteville Baraboo/Sauk County have been working closely with their local partners to target educational programs that best serve the community and has had success turning around enrollment. Opportunities exist to diversify educational opportunities on these campuses through new four-year programs and/or strategic partnerships.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Sauk County requests that the Wisconsin Legislature and the Governor develop a comparable grant program to assist in the retooling of the remaining two-year campuses for educational and diversifying the use of buildings that are presently not needed by the university system.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the grant program be used for the development of educational, recreational, governmental uses, or attracting private entities that serve the city, county, university, staff, and/or students (such as a daycare center as one example), or other purposes the Legislature may deem fit for the campus.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution shall be presented to the Wisconsin Counties Association (WCA) at the Annual Meeting in order to be considered for the 2025 WCA lobbying efforts.

BACKGROUND: Sauk County released an RFP requesting proposals from Civil Engineering Firms to provide a variety of engineering services required by the LRE Department including, but not being limited to:

- Review of plans and specifications for construction projects of varying complexity while
 providing guidance to meet established standards and best practices for stormwater and
 erosion control management.
- Review stormwater and erosion control plans for large projects such as subdivision developments and for smaller scale private developments consistent with Sauk County Ch 51 Erosion Control and Stormwater Management Ordinance.
- Evaluate manure storage facilities in accordance with Sauk County Ch 26 Agriculture Performance Standards and Manure Management Ordinance.
- Review plans and specifications for conservation practice designs in accordance with USDA-NRCS technical standards.
- Conduct as-built inspections, as needed, in the field or virtually utilizing information gathered from staff inspections.
- Attend on-site and virtual project-related meetings, such as pre-bid, pre-construction, and project management meetings.
- Maintain detailed project related reviews, observations, and documentation, which can be provided to the county upon request.

The Department received three (3) proposals from reputable engineering firms; and upon review of the proposals found GRAEF to be most advantageous for the Department. Entering into a contract with a civil engineer offers the LRE Department access to professional services that are needed to efficiently administer county ordinance requirements, to readily access engineering services for varied types of projects and negate the need to continually release requests for bids for civil engineering services every time said services are required thereby improving project review efficiency.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that a contract with GRAEF be awarded on a 2-year basis with an automatic renewal until such time that either party chooses to exit the contract.

Resolution to Amend the Land Resources and Environment 2024 Budget for the Purchase of Permitting & Licensing Community Development Software from Opengov

Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee and Finance, Personnel, & Insurance Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: The Land Resources and Environment Department's Planning and Zoning Service area uses a system to track all the various permits and processes that are required to implement state statutes and county ordinances through a program known as PZ Systems. Prior to 2001, there was an Access Database for each individual program or functional area. To consolidate the programs, the department worked with MIS to bring all this data together and to implement file sharing with the AS400 Tax System. Septic pumpers were also brought into the program through a lotus notes-based program that was located on the County website, in which pumpers would log-in to record parcel information for systems that had been pumped in accordance with state statute requirements.

Even this shared programming had limitations; and as a result, PZ Systems was born in 2016. PZ Systems is a program that was designed utilizing an outside consultant. The same consultant that designed the system was also brought in each time there were issues or updates needed to the program. As with any program, the system is now unsupported and is unable to conduct the additional functions that are necessary, for instance, a public portal where individuals can apply online for permits or inspections directly into the system.

Over the course of almost a year, the Department has reviewed five (5) different software providers and programs to find the software that would be most beneficial to the Department and the public we serve. Opengov was selected as the best option for the Department's needs moving forward.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that the County Administrator is authorized to enter a contract with Opengov for Permitting and Licensing Community Development Software for an amount not to exceed \$90,380.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the LRE Budget be amended to include revenue/expenditure in the amount of \$90,380 using \$28,186 of carryforward funds and \$62,194 General Fund Balance.





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

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: Established by Section 11529 of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA), also known as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) (Pub. L. 117-58), \$45M was appropriated in 2023 to the American Transportation Infrastructure and Investment Program (ATIIP). This program "takes a holistic, network-level approach to walking, biking, and rolling. The program addresses gaps in active transportation routes that push people to other modes of travel".

Upon review of the program goals and criteria that will be used to evaluate the applications, the Land Resources and Environment Department believes that the Great Sauk State Trail Corridor project would be a fit for the program. The Department would look to request \$12M for the engineering design and construction of the corridor. The federal share of cost matching cannot exceed 80%, which means the County would be responsible for a \$3M match if awarded the funds.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, hereby authorize the submittal of an application to the Active Transportation Infrastructure Investment Program (ATIIP); and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that should the grant be awarded to Sauk County, the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, commits the required \$3,000,000 matching funds for engineering design and construction of the Great Sauk State Trail Corridor.

Resolution to Authorize a Two-Year Extension of the Sauk County Groundwater Trend Data Project

Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Environment Committee and Finance, Personnel, & Insurance Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: In 2019, Staff from Land Resources and Environment, Conservation, Public Health, and Extension Sauk County joined in collaboration with the UW Stevens Point Center for Watershed Science and Education to develop a citizen-based groundwater monitoring program. This 5-year program was designed to test the same wells over a set time period in order to collect data that can be useful in understanding well water quality fluctuations over time and space. Participation and interest in the project were strong with nearly 80% of the original households participating through the entirety of the project. The project concluded in 2023 and a predictive model was developed to identify areas where nitrate contamination is likely to be found. This model may help to inform residents of the potential risk of nitrate contamination in areas of future develop and assist the county with future land use planning guidelines. However, additional years of data are helpful in making this model more accurate. UW Stevens Point recommends extending the project two years to collect additional data to build a more robust model. A project proposal labeled as Exhibit A outlines the methodology, timeline, type of testing, reporting, community education, deliverables, and budget for the extension of the Sauk County Groundwater Quality Trend Data project.

NOW, THERFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, to authorize a two-year extension of the Sauk County Groundwater Trend Data Project.

Groundwater Quality Trend Data

Project Proposal

PURPOSE OF TRACKING GROUNDWATER QUALITY TREND DATA

Sauk County has been partnering with the Center for Watershed Science and Education to monitor 300 wells annually as part of a community driven data collection effort to learn more about well water quality. Few communities have the ability to track trends in well water quality; establishing this network of private well owners has aided our understanding of how groundwater quality is changing over time and contributes to learning about potential causes of observed change.

Analysis of the nearby land use and well construction of private wells with long-term data can help identify which factors may be contributing to declining or improving groundwater quality. This information is useful for informing of conservation efforts, well construction guidelines, and well water outreach efforts in Sauk County. What is learned from monitoring this network of wells can then be applied more generally to Sauk County groundwater as a whole.

Participants were previously selected to ensure wells are representative of Sauk County geology, land cover, and rural well density. We successfully sampled more than 300 wells in each of the 5 years. Multiple years of data from the same wells increases our ability to understand whether increases or decreases represent a true trend or simply a change in concentration between two points in time. Five years was the minimum number of years recommended for this project. We propose collecting an additional two years of data to provide confidence in trend data and provide a longer record for potential correlation of trends to climatic and/or annual land cover data.




Figure 1. Data on trends in the 301 wells that submitted samples for the past 5 years. Red symbols represent increasing trends (9%), blue decreasing (13%), and yellow indicate no trend (79%). The larger the symbol, the greater the rate of change.




Figure 2. Example of a well participating in the project that displays an increasing trend.

METHODOLOGY & TIMELINE

Timeline

The proposed contract period is from July 1 2024 through June 30 2026. The project activities are as follows:

- Mail Sample Kits (September)
- Testing (November)
- Mail Results (January)
- Update Dashboard/Educational program (March)
- Annual Report (June)

Tests

Confidence in this trend data enables isolating areas where nitrate and/or chloride are increasing or decreasing. Additional parameters allow us to understand water quality changes are related to land use or other factors that may be influencing measurements such as weather/climate, add confidence to results, and provide important information about other water quality characteristics.

Nitrate

Nitrate is an important test for private well owners. Levels greater than 10 mg/L nitrate-nitrogen should not be consumed by infants, women who are or trying to become pregnant. Everyone is encouraged to avoid long-term consumption of nitrate greater than 10 mg/L.

Nitrate is a chemical commonly found in agricultural and lawn fertilizer. It is also produced when organic rich materials such as manure, bio-solids, septic system effluent, etc. decompose. Nitrate is a very soluble form of nitrogen and can easily leach past the root zone of plants into our groundwater. Levels of nitrate in groundwater are generally less than 1 mg/L in natural or areas of little human influence. Elevated levels generally occur in areas of agricultural activity or areas of dense rural development (i.e. small lot sizes with septic systems, lawn fertilizers, etc.). Soils and geology make certain areas more prone to nitrate losses to groundwater. For these reasons, nitrate is a good test to perform if trying to understanding the impacts of land use on groundwater quality as well as trends over time.

Chloride

Like nitrate, chloride is a useful tool for understanding the impacts of land use. Major sources of chloride to groundwater include fertilizer, road salting and septic system drainfields. Potash is used to add potassium to soil. The most common form of potash is potassium chloride; the chloride is susceptible to leaching. Road salt (usually sodium chloride) helps in deicing roads, but is then washed off roads into ditches or other pervious areas where it soaks into the soil and can eventually leach to groundwater. Septic system drain fields dispose of wastewater which contains chloride from human waste and water softener salt.




Figure 3. Map showing the risk of a well encountering elevated nitrate based on a statistical model that was applied to each parcel in Sauk County. Red indicates higher risk and blue lower risk. Statistical model was developed using data from first 5 years of the project.

Alkalinity

Alkalinity is a measure of water's ability to neutralize acid. It is generated by the dissolution of carbonate minerals common to Wisconsin. Groundwater alkalinity measurements are relatively stable from one year to the next. Testing for alkalinity may help in understanding whether weather variability is influencing particular water samples since alkalinity should be relatively consistent under normal conditions.

Conductivity

Conductivity is a measure of the amount of total dissolved ions in water but does not give an indication of which minerals are present. In most uncontaminated waters however, conductivity is about twice the total hardness value in an unsoftened water source. Changes in conductivity over time may indicate changes in overall water quality. There are no health concerns at levels of conductivity found in Wisconsin's groundwater.

Hardness

Hardness measures the amount of calcium and magnesium in water. Hard water can cause scale deposits on fixtures, in pipes or water heaters. Water that is naturally low in hardness is often referred to as soft and can be corrosive. There are no health concerns associated with drinking hard water. Water less than 150 mg/L is considered soft while values greater than 200 mg/L are considered hard. Concentrations are expressed as mg/L as CaCO₃.

pН

The pH test is a measure of acidity. The lower the pH, the more corrosive the water. There is no health standard for pH, however corrosion of metal plumbing or fixtures is more likely to occur when pH levels are less than 7. Water greater than 7 is more likely to result in scaling. Low pH water may be more likely to result in elevated levels of copper and/or lead if those elements are included in your plumbing system.

Well Testing

Sample kits will be mailed to all participants who have remained with the program for all 5 years. Participants will collect their sample and send back to the laboratory using a pre-paid mailer. Samples will be analyzed at the Water and Environmental Analysis Laboratory at UW-Stevens Point, which is state-certified to perform the tests of interest. Following sample analysis participants will be mailed a copy of their individual result along with interpretive information.

Reporting & Education

An annual summary of results will be generated for Sauk County that provides an overview, summary data, and interpretation of results. Important metrics that we would typically report on: average, median, minimum, maximum concentrations by county, towns, aquifer category, land use, and casing depth. Percentage of wells increasing/decreasing. Maps will be generated to provide understanding of water quality across Sauk County.

Our intent is not to display or share the data at a parcel level but provide a general idea of groundwater quality spatially. As a result, we plan to map display data at a county-wide scale to the centroid of a section (1 square mile area). The project dashboard will be updated annually to reflect additional years of individual parameters, trends over time, and historical data. Data & Project Deliverables

This work will result in the following project deliverables:

- 1. An annual in-person update and educational session/open house event.
- 2. An annual report will be provided to Sauk County at the completion of each year summarizing results from the annual testing.
- 3. After each well test, each well owner will receive a copy of their individual test results along with interpretive information.
- 4. The Sauk County online interactive data visualization tool will be updated to catalogue data and make available to the public and county for outreach/educational purposes.
- 5. Data will be archived in the Center for Watershed Science and Education database and integrated into the WI Well Water Viewer. The viewer aggregates well water data to a 1 square mile area.
- 6. Any databases, raw data files, or other electronic files generated as a result of this project will be provided via preferred format to Sauk County.

Expectations from Sauk County

In order for the Center for Watershed Science and Education to carry out the project, the following support from Sauk County departments is anticipated:

- 1. Assistance arranging open houses or outreach events for participants to learn about the project and project results (Sauk County Extension).
- 2. Access to parcel level data and geographic information system support with names/addresses of residents for the purposes of identifying potential participants (Sauk County Land Information/GIS).
- 3. Communication of project results with county officials and county departments (UW-Madison Extension Sauk County, Sauk County Land Resources & Environment, Sauk County Department of Health)
- 4. Provide review of any recruitment materials, outreach materials, or other communication materials that result from this project (UW-Madison Extension Sauk County, Sauk County Land Resources & Environment, Sauk County Department of Health)

Why can't the data used from regularly tested dairy farms work for trend data?

Dairy farms are only required to test for bacteria. Additionally, this would rely on farmers voluntarily sharing that information since this information is not required to be shared publicly or currently maintained in a database.

Is this duplicating monitoring wells?

Monitoring wells are often used to measure field scale or site specific problems. For example, if you suspected that a landfill or manure storage facility were leaking, a network of monitoring wells adjacent to the site would be the appropriate strategy to answer that question. The intent of this project is to learn about groundwater quality more generally across all of Sauk County. As a result, it is important to design a network that is representative of a broad range of factors (ex. Soils, geology, land-use, depth, etc.) that are likely to contribute to groundwater quality of rural residential wells in the area being studied.

Would it be possible to keep weather data alongside the data and use that to help understand the data and possible implications?

Yes. If there are quality weather stations that are providing publicly available data, we could summarize annual and/or monthly weather data in the annual report or other outreach/educational materials.

How will this proposal be formatted in a way that makes it accessible and easy for decision-makers to use? It is our goal as outreach specialists to make sure information is effectively communicated and easily understood. The center has experience with online mapping platforms and other data visualization tools and techniques. We also envision using a storyboard approach which is becoming popular for communicating information of this type. Lastly, we will evaluate our products as we go to ensure that we are effectively reaching our intended audience.

Is there any grant funding available to assist with this type of research?

There is currently very limited funding. Some counties have used health grants from the Wisconsin Department of Health Services to fund one-time projects related to well water testing through their county health department. However, obtaining a grant is not guaranteed and sustained work beyond one year would benefit from long-term county buy-in.

What implications will a well test in one area have for a well tested in another area of Sauk County? What we learn about how geology, land-use, and well construction impact water quality can then be applied to other wells that have not been tested. From this information we hope to create a statistical model that can be used to understand water quality across Sauk County.

How will the information be used and shared?

As part of our public outreach mission we anticipate using the information in outreach programming related to groundwater quality. Information will be used by researchers to investigate the relationship of geology, land use, and well construction on groundwater quality. Data will be summarized for annual and final reports. Data will be mapped for final reports and educational purposes, but not at a level that will allow the data to be identified to an individual parcel.

GENERAL CODE OF SAUK COUNTY, WISCONSIN ORDINANCE AMENDMENT # 2 2024 Ordinance Amendment to ordinance sections 10.05 and 10.15 of the Sauk County

Ordinance Amendment offered by the Property and Land Resources and Environment Committees

Ordinances related to the creation of the Historic Courthouse Park

BACKGROUND: The Sauk County Board of Supervisors has created the "Historic Courthouse Park. Chapter 10 of the County ordinances regulates parks in Sauk County. It is the intent of the Property Committee and the Land Resources and Environment Committee that the "Historic Courthouse Park" be managed by the Building Services Department and not the Land Resources and Environment Department as currently set forth in the ordinances.

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NOW, THEREFORE, THE SAUK COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Any existing ordinances, codes, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict with this ordinance shall be and hereby are repealed as far as any conflict exists.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect the day after passage and publication as required by law.

Section 3. If any claims, provisions or portions of this ordinance are adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

Section 4. Section 10.05 and 10.15 of the General Code of Sauk County, Wisconsin, is amended as follows [additions noted by underline, deletions noted by strikethrough]:

Sec. 10.05. - Special events.

Planned or advertised public meetings or assemblies, sporting and athletic events or other special events, are allowed in parks only by written permit issued by the Director or the Director's designee. A special event application and policy can be obtained through the Land Resources and Environment Department. See Section 10.15(c) below regarding permits for the use of the Historic Courthouse Park.

Sec. 10.15. - Other permits.

- (a) All permits shall be issued by the Committee, Director, or their designee, in writing, except camping permits, shelter permits or building use permits issued by the Director or their designee, and subject to the park rules and regulations, and the persons to whom such permits have been granted shall be bound by said rules and regulations as fully as though the same were inserted in said permits, and any person or persons to whom such permits have been granted shall be liable for any loss, damage, or injury sustained by the Committee. Department or by negligence of the person or person to whom such permits have been granted, their servants or agents.

(b) Until otherwise directed by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, the Sauk County Land Resources and Environment Committee is hereby authorized to adopt additional or revised rules and regulations for the
