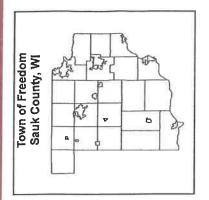

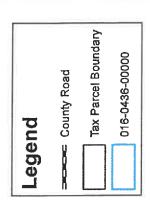

Resolution to Request the State of Wisconsin, in its 2025-27 State Biennial Budget, Provide State General Purpose Revenue (GPR) Funding to Cover the Full Non-Federal Share of MA CSP and Crisis Services

Resolution offered by the Health Resources Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: Sauk County ("County") is concerned that the public mental health system in Wisconsin is in need of additional resources to respond appropriately to the needs of individuals with persistent mental illness and those experiencing a mental health crisis.

State law designates counties with the responsibility for the well-being, treatment, and care of individuals with mental illness, and serving those without private insurance coverage.

The Medical Assistance program (MA) covers an array of mental health services, ranging from office-based therapy to inpatient hospitalization, and many of these services are delivered by counties.

Community Support Programs (CSP) offer intensive community-based care for adults whose mental illness and functional limitations might otherwise require them to need institutionalized care. Counties use CSP services to keep people out of extended hospitalizations and support people in the community following emergency detentions.

Counties are required to provide Crisis intervention services including an emergency mental health services program to serve persons in crisis situations; at a minimum, 24-hour crisis telephone service and 24-hour in-person response on an on-call basis.

While the state pays the full cost of most MA services, when it comes to county-based CSP and Crisis mental health services, the county finances the cost of the services up front, and receives MA reimbursement for only the federal share for that service.

Community Aids funding has not kept pace over the years with increased county costs for services, resulting in counties bearing a disproportionate share of CSP and Crisis service costs from county tax levy.

Counties are limited in their capacity to use tax levy revenue due to state levy limits, so the lack of Community Aids increases combined with strict property tax controls makes it difficult for counties to maintain Crisis and CSP services.

In addition to the costs to county human service departments, counties and municipalities also incur law enforcement costs to transport and provide security for persons in a crisis.

The awareness of the 988 National Suicide & Crisis Lifeline has made mental health assessment and referral more readily available, resulting in more demand on the mental health crisis systems.

Stagnant state funding results in variations in the extent of services available across counties, wait lists for services, and eligible people receiving limited services.

The limited state funding for Crisis services makes it difficult for counties to implement new evidence-based services, such as mobile crisis workers that could

meet law enforcement officers in the field for crisis calls, that would reduce the need for law enforcement involvement and provide a more trauma-informed response to crisis situations.

Wisconsin's counties continue to cover the costs of mental health services for individuals who are not Medicaid eligible.

THEREFORE, **BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Sauk County Board of Supervisors does hereby request that the State of Wisconsin, in its 2025-27 state biennial budget, provide state GPR funding to cover the full non-federal share of MA CSP and Crisis services.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Sauk County Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to send a copy of this Resolution to the Governor of the State of Wisconsin, Wisconsin State Legislators with a constituency within Sauk County, and the Wisconsin Counties Association.

BACKGROUND: Public Health Vending Machines protect and promote the health and safety of people in Sauk county who use drugs. Many people do not seek assistance or services for their drug use due to a fear of being judged and arrested. The Public Health Vending Machine acts as a highly accessible, safe option for people to obtain free lifesaving help, including Fentanyl Test Strips and Narcan®/naloxone, the opioid overdose reversal medication.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors that the 2024 Public Health budget will be amended to include \$145,000.00 for contractual and supply expenses for the Public Health Vending Machine Project.

Resolution to AUTHORIZE THE CREATION OF ONE FULL-TIME NURSE SUPERVISOR FOR THE NURSE-FAMILY PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

Resolution offered by the Health Resources Committee, Finance and Personnel & Insurance Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: The Nurse-Family Partnership program started in Sauk County in 2015 with one nurse and has since expanded to four full-time nurse home visitors and one nurse who carries a smaller caseload and provides oversight of the program (PHN MB).

PHN MB has been with the department since 2014. Her position is 50% tax levy and 50% grant funded (Federal Maternal Infant Early Childhood Home Visiting grant). With the exponential growth of the program, Public Health Sauk County would like PHN MB to assume the full-time duties of a nurse supervisor, including the annual evaluations of the Nurse-Family Partnership program staff. This will allow for the most efficient and effective management structure for our department. PHN MB has demonstrated excellent supervisory skills and has expressed an interest in assuming a leadership role. This supports PHN MB's career goal, contributes to job satisfaction and employee retention. Her current position will not be backfilled and there is no fiscal impact (with the exception of a step increase) with this transition.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that effective September 15, 2024, the Public Health Supervisor position will be created. The Public Health Nurse position 40008 will be eliminated with the creation of the supervisor position.

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RESOLUTION # 70 - 2024

Resolution Authorizing Participation in the County Conservation Aids Grant Program

Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Extension Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) has grant funding available through the County Conservation Aids (CCA) program, specifically for the improvement of fish and wildlife resources under Wis. Stat. § 23.09(12). The CCA program is administered as a cost-sharing program, meaning the grant covers up to 50% of total project costs. The Land Resources and Environment Department plans to use the 2025 grant funds towards establishing prairie strips at the Sauk County Farm.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that the Administrator is authorized to act on behalf of Sauk County to sign and submit an application to the WDNR for Conservation Aid Funds, enter into an agreement/contract with the DNR, submit to the WDNR reimbursement claims along with necessary supporting documentation and reports within one (1) year of project end date, and take necessary action to undertake, direct, and complete the approved project; and,

Resolution to Authorize an Amendment to a Contract with Ayres Associates for Engineering Services for the Delton Dam

Resolution offered by the Land Resources and Extension Committee

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Sauk County, Wisconsin:

BACKGROUND: During the 2019 inspection of the Delton Dam, it was noticed that there was a concrete spalling and repairs were necessary. In June 2022, the County entered a contract with Ayres Associates to engineer the project. A second inspection in December 2021, noted that a concrete training wall near the edge of the dam shifted. In discussion with representatives of JF Brennan on-site as well as phone conversations with Ayres Associates, this was not an imminent issue, but did need to be addressed. The LRE Department amended its contract with Ayres Associates to include this scope of work, which was approved by the County Board by Resolution No. 5-2022 on January 18, 2022.

Upon submittal of plans to the Department of Natural Resources; and further engineering investigation of the issues at the dam, it was found that the plans need to be amended to address other items that have been identified. The LRE Department would like to amend the engineering contract to refine the plans to address all issues at the dam.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, the County Administrator is authorized to enter an amended contract, Exhibit A, with Ayres Associates for the additional necessary engineering work and other services as noted for an amount of \$42,400; bringing the not to exceed cost of the agreement to \$71,600.

AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT (2)

Amendment dated August 26, 2024

The Agreement for Professional Services made as of January 26, 2022 between Sauk County (OWNER) and Ayres Associates Inc, 700 Pilgrim Way, Suite 180, Green Bay, WI 54304 (CONSULTANT) and amended on April 24, 2024 is hereby amended again as set forth below.

REASON FOR AMENDMENT

While completing the scope of work described in the January 26, 2022 Original Agreement, CONSULTANT became aware of a potentially significant scour hole at the toe of Delton Dam's spillway, which likely caused the failure of the fishing platform immediately downstream. Given the unprotected toe at the base of the spillway, which extends all the way across the river channel, CONSULTANT suspected that additional scour and spillway undermining may also be present. These issues, if present and left unaddressed, could pose a significant threat to the safety of the dam.

To address these concerns, the Original Agreement was amended to include an underwater inspection of the area immediately downstream of the dam. The underwater inspection, which was completed on June 12, 2024, identified scour and undermining that has developed downstream of the dam's overflow spillway, auxiliary spillway, and fishing platform. Based on these findings, CONSULANT prepared a conceptual repair plan to address the collapsed fishing platform and the documented scour and undermining. The conceptual repair plan consists of grout bags to be installed underwater to fill and protect undermined areas of existing spillways and removal and replacement of the fishing platform with a terraced gabion basket structure.

With the Scope of Services for Amendment 1 now complete, CONSULTANT presents Amendment 2 (this document) to OWNER for review. Amendment 2 expands Amendment 1 to include engineering design, bidding assistance, and construction observation/administration for the conceptual repair plan developed under Amendment 1.

CHANGES TO AMENDED AGREEMENT

Add the following tasks to the Scope of Services:

- 1. For Design Phase, after receiving written notification from OWNER, CONSULTANT shall:
 - Prepare a set of preliminary design documents based upon the conceptual repair plan developed under Amendment 1. Preliminary design documents shall include a set of Drawings, an outline of technical Specifications, and an opinion of probable project cost. CONSULTANT shall present the preliminary design documents to OWNER via virtual meeting.
 - Following OWNER's acceptance of the preliminary design documents, CONSUTLANT shall prepare a final set of Drawings, technical Specifications, and a revised opinion of probable project cost and provide these final design documents to OWNER for review and approval.
 - Following OWNER"s acceptance of the final design documents, CONSULTANT shall submit
 these documents and a Ch. 31 permit application to repair the dam, on OWNER's behalf, to the
 WDNR. CONSULTANT shall pay the permit application review fee, estimated to be approximately
 \$500, and invoice OWNER for reimbursement including a 10% administrative fee.
- 2. For Bidding Phase, after receiving written notification from OWNER, CONSULTANT shall:
 - Prepare a set of construction contract documents based on the approved Drawings and Specifications for the project and front-end contract language from EJCDC C-700 Standard General Conditions of the Construction Contract.

- Assist OWNER with advertising the project for public bidding. CONSULTANT's services include advertising to obtain bids for one prime construction contract. CONSULTANT shall administer bidding using the QuestCDN online platform.
- · Attend one onsite pre-bid meeting at the site.
- Answer contractor questions, review substitution requests, and issue addenda, as needed.
- Facilitate a virtual bid opening where submitted bids will be opened electronically via QuestCDN and read aloud.
- Submit the OWNER's selected bid to the WDNR for review and approval, a requirement under the Municipal Dam Grant Program.
- Prepare and circulate to all parties a construction contract for review and approval.
- 3. For Construction Phase, after a fully executed construction contract is in force, CONSULTANT shall:
 - Make up to four visits to the site at various points during and after construction, as CONSULTANT deems appropriate. CONSULTANT shall document site visits in field reports to be submitted to the OWNER, contractor, and WDNR.
 - Facilitate weekly meetings with OWNER and contractor during construction.
 - · Review submittals and shop drawings submitted by contractor.
 - Review applications for payment submitted by contractor.
 - Issue a substantial completion certificate, and punch list, as appropriate.
 - Assist OWNER with closing out the construction contract.
- 4. For Post-Construction Phase, after a fully executed construction contract is in force, CONSULTANT shall:
 - Prepare and submit to the WDNR a set of record drawings based on contractor markups provided to CONSULTANT following construction.
 - Prepare and submit to the WDNR a letter of conformance to contract documents, as appropriate.
 - Prepare and submit to the WDNR construction photos and test reports, as appropriate.
 - Assist the OWNER with completing the WDNR's Municipal Dam Grant reimbursement form.
 OWNER will provide to CONSULTANT copies of invoices and canceled checks to support reimbursement requests. CONSULTANT shall provide completed form to OWNER for final review and submittal to the WDNR.
- 5. To Additional Services, add the following paragraphs:

CONSULTANT's scope of services and fee are based on the understanding that the repairs shall consist of grout bags, to be placed underwater, and terraced gabion baskets. Deviations from this plan, whether due to OWNER direction, WDNR direction, or because of information unavailable at the time of this amendment, shall entitle CONSULTANT to renegotiation of scope and fee.

CONSULTANT anticipates that currently available survey data are of sufficient quantity and quality to support design. If additional survey becomes necessary, CONSULTANT can provide this as an additional service.

CONSULTANT anticipates that construction will take place in 2025. Should construction occur later, due to reasons beyond CONSULTANT's control, CONSULTANT reserves the right to negotiate a fee increase accordingly.

6. To Time Schedule, add the following paragraph:

CONSULTANT shall submit to OWNER preliminary design documents within 45 calendar days of execution of this amendment.

Following OWNER's acceptance of preliminary design documents, CONSULTANT shall furnish to OWNER final design documents within 30 calendar days.

Following OWNER's acceptance of final design documents, CONSULTANT shall submit a WDNR Ch. 31 permit application within 5 calendar days.

CONSULTANT shall commence bidding-phase services upon receipt of written authorization from OWNER. CONSULTANT anticipates that bidding will take place in late winter or early spring of 2025.

CONSULTANT shall commence construction-phase services when a fully executed construction contract between the OWNER and a prime contractor is in place. CONSULTANT anticipates that construction will take place in summer or fall of 2025.

CONSULTANT shall commence post-construction-phase services when contractor's work is deemed by CONSULTANT to be complete.

7. Delete the entire Fee section and replace with the following:

We will complete the services described in this Amended Agreement for a lump sum of \$42,400. This brings the total not-to-exceed cost of the Agreement to \$71,600.

I began to utilize CADD exclusively in 1991, beginning with AutoCAD Version 9 for MS-DOS and Intergraph Microstation Version 3.0. At that time, MSA had only six CADD stations in a then 130-person firm. I was named Land Information Specialist for the firm and also developed and implemented CADD standards for all surveying staff to utilize. I also assisted a national-level client to develop CADD standards which other consultants would later follow. My proficiency was acknowledged by the Wisconsin Society of Land Surveyors, by winning several awards in their annual Map and Plat Contests.

I was introduced to Geographic Information System (GIS) software early in the 1990s, being trained in ESRI ArcCad for MS-DOS for 40 hours at the University of Wisconsin - Madison.

I also began to utilize electronic distance measuring (EDM) equipment by 1991. Early equipment sets included digital theodolites and top-mount EDMs, while still collecting completely hard field notes. Shortly thereafter, Total Stations were implemented at the firm and our first exposure to electronic data collection began. One of my most memorable control surveys was performed with a Geodimeter 440 Total Station and Geodat 400 Data Collector, completely traversing the Village of Lake Delton, Wisconsin for its water distribution system planning in the early 1990s.

1993 brang my introduction to GPS, as applied to land surveying. Utilizing Ashtech model Z-12 receivers, many control surveys were performed to support land information projects.

Obtaining licensure as a Land Surveyor in the State of Wisconsin in 1993 allowed me to advance my position at MSA to that of Professional Surveyor and Project Manager. Having worked directly under licensed land surveyors since beginning my career, this transition came naturally and the newfound duties proceeded swiftly.

Project Manager Responsibilities added client consultation, project research, compliance verification, project cost estimating and budgeting, project scheduling, owner representation and market development responsibilities.

In my final two years of employment at MSA, I was assigned increasingly larger projects to complete and thoroughly expanded my professional knowledge as a result. This level of experience would prepare me for my duties as Deputy County Surveyor for Eau Claire County Wisconsin.

October 1995 through October 1998 Eau Claire County Government Deputy County Surveyor

In October of 1995, I was appointed Deputy County Surveyor of Eau Claire County Wisconsin. Eau Claire County was accelerating their Public Land Surveying System (PLSS) corner perpetuation and maintenance and had launched a specific program to accomplish these tasks. I was appointed to develop standard operating procedures, hire and train staff and to manage the program. Eau Claire County includes 18 civil townships containing some 2,500 PLSS corners.

Staff included an Assistant County Surveyor who was also a Licensed Surveyor and two Surveyor Technicians and I received administrative and professional guidance from the County Surveyor.

My first task was to organize the office, surveying equipment and vehicles necessary for the program and to develop a training and procedures manual for every step in the PLSS corner remonumentation process. These procedures were subsequently taught to staff as they were hired into their positions and included: health and safety training; research; land law; field reconnaissance methods; use of surveying equipment (including GPS, total stations and electronic data collection devices); data reduction and adjustment of both GPS and conventionally-collected information; staking of boundaries and construction improvements; corner maintenance and marking; database population and reporting; computer-aided drafting and design (CADD) drafting and base cadastral mapping for tax parcel map development.

With the purchase of the TOPCON GPS System, professional training in data processing techniques was required and provided by TOPCON programming personnel. Fully-automatic total stations, intelligent data collection and CADD software were used in this process, as well.

As work was completed, a database was developed and populated to track the status of the PLSS corners within the county and to be incorporated into the County GIS.

During my time with Eau Claire County, three civil townships were completely remonumented, controlled and documented. Approximately 25% of the corners had been proved to have been previously perpetuated in error and approximately 65% of previous geodetic location information for the corners was deemed grossly inaccurate.

In addition to the PLSS program, the project team was utilized for other positioning needs of Eau Claire County. These projects included: control surveys for remote sensing, investigative surveys for violations of county ordinances, forensic surveys for the Sherriff's department, floodplain surveys, property legal research, surveys for county-owned lands, property line maintenance and dispute resolution for county forestry projects and other surveys as requested.

Additionally, I was assigned with the review process of land divisions within the county, as well as all survey documents submitted for statutory filing in the office of County Surveyor. I also acted as the County Surveyor in his absence.

As Survey Team Leader, I was responsible for the planning, organization, budgeting, scheduling, data management, professional advancement and market development of the firm's land surveying department. The department served all of the firms' disciplines as well as their own clientele in need of professional land surveying and positioning services. I also acted as the firm's resident GPS expert. It was at this time that I was professionally trained in Trimble Geomatics Office Software by Trimble at their Sunnyvale, California facility.

One of the firms' largest market sectors at the time was GIS and land information projects. Under my management, many projects that required precise geodetic positioning of various monumentation, features and improvements were completed.

One of the firms' licensed land surveyors served as the elected Sauk County Surveyor from 1986 until the year 2000. Barb,

As requested, I am providing you with a proposed conceptual database model for future use in managing PLSS corner information for Richland County PLSS corners.

Richland County Government has been very progressive in the last 30 years by completing substantial re-monumentation of nearly all PLSS corners within its boundaries. Most of these corners have been documented in accordance with Wisconsin Administrative Code Chapter A-E 7.08, by virtue of a U.S. Public Land Survey Monument Record or "Tie Sheet". Additionally, approximately 65% of these corners have been assigned survey-grade (1-2 cm-level) coordinates related to the Wisconsin Coordinate Reference System (WISCRS). The PLSS serves as the framework for land description in Richland County and the coordinate values provide a geographically correct spatial reference system to base the Geographic Information System (GIS) upon.

There are many initiatives by Federal, State and Local Governments already underway throughout the PLSS states that have established a basis for development of PLSS database models, which I feel we should build upon to have a model that will integrate easily with other systems already in place. One such initiative is the Wisconsin State Cartographer's Office (SCO) statewide PLSS layer project. It is my intent to include adequate fields of information across several tables to allow such integration.

Given this brief background, I am proposing four main tables to allow this information to be maintained effectively. Inside these tables there are other opportunities to further divide the dataset, which I have denoted with an asterisk (*) and added comments.

Table 1: PLSS CORNERS

This table shall serve as the main table in the database, containing information for <u>every</u> PLSS corner within the County and will provide essential location information for the corner as related to the PLSS. This table shall have one-to-many relationships with the other tables, as each corner may have multiple documents and/or coordinates assigned to it, but there is only one corner location, being where it was originally placed in the original Government Land Office (GLO) survey.

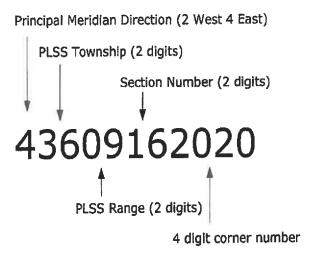
Wisconsin Corner Point Identification System January 2006

The Wisconsin Point Identification system was developed by a special committee chaired by Mike Romportl, Oneida County Surveyor in the early 1990's. This system has been adopted by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) in their Land Net program and has been propagated by the Wisconsin Land Information Program.

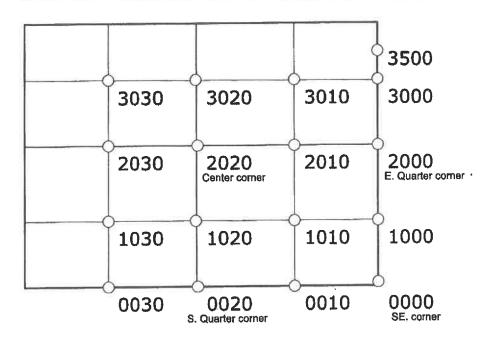
This paper is based on the original document from the Romportl special committee.

Definition

The Wisconsin Point ID is a system of numbering corners of the Public Land Survey System in Wisconsin that provides a unique number for each corner. The basic components of the Wisconsin Point ID are as shown below.



The 4 digit corner number identifies the corner based on its position within the section. A section divided in sixteenths is shown below.



This system uses the south to north approach in a section as shown above. Rows are numbered from 00-30 south to north and columns are numbered east to west 00-30. As shown in the figure above the Southeast corner of a section is always the origin of the system being 0000. Other corners are numbered as shown in the Figure, for example the South quarter corner is 0020; the center corner is 2020; and the East quarter corner is 2000.

These numbers always identify the locations listed regardless of the size of the section. The row and column number is prefixed by the principal meridian indicator, town, range, and section number that is immediately north and west of the corner or point being defined. In Wisconsin, there is only one principal meridian so there is no need for an identifier of the principal meridian itself.

To make the number unique the south and eastern most section lines always take precedence. So in the figure above the corners along the north line of the section illustrated are numbered from the section number to the North.

Special Situations

Closing Corners

Closing corners are numbered according to the section in which they close not the section above or to the west. Use row 40 and the corresponding row and/or column to assign the number.

In special cases such as a closing corner on a standard parallel (correction line), the row would be assigned 90 and the town, range, and section which the closing corner controls would be its prefix. The 40-90 row series acts as a red flag situation.

Excess

Another special case is when excess or deficiencies in sections which were put into the north and west part or the township and Government Lots were assigned resembling ¼-¼ sections. For these cases the rows and/or columns could continue up to 80 to accommodate this condition.

Meander Corners

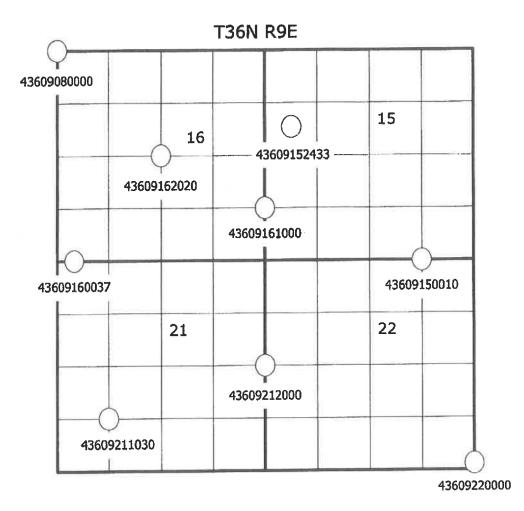
Meander Corners would be assigned identifications based on an approximation of the row and column number where it lies in the section since they do not fall in predicted locations.

Control

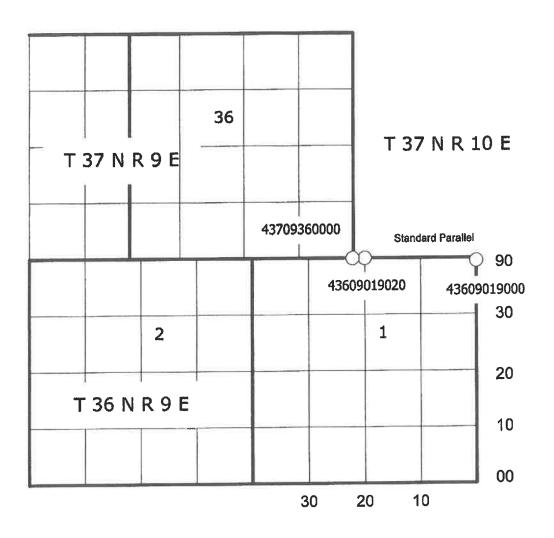
Other control points both vertical and horizontal are included in this schema by assigning identifications of an approximate row/column number. This places the control approximately inside a sixteenth area.

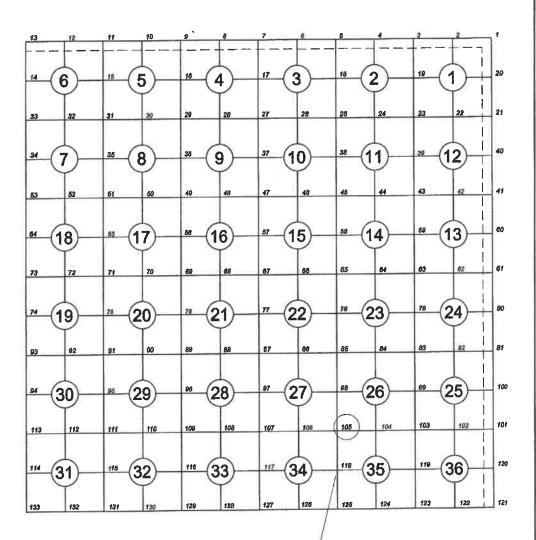

BACKGROUND: On July 23, 2024 a 2020 Ford Explorer police package marked squad belonging to Sauk County was heavily damaged by gun fire. The squad car has been declared a total loss by the County's insurance adjusters. A replacement squad is needed. The County can purchase a 2023 Ford Explorer from Kayser Ford of Madison with a cost of \$40,500. Sauk County will be receiving an insurance payment of \$32,078 for the squad car with the additional amount from the self insurance fund for the deductible.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, that the Sauk County Sheriff be and hereby authorized to purchase a 2023 Ford Explorer from Kayser Ford of Madison for a cost of \$40,500.

After examination of the bids your Committee recommends it to be in the best interest of Sauk County to accept the bid of Zacho Sports Center Inc of Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin for a 2025 Lund boat, 2025 ShoreLand'r trailer and a 115 EXLPT Mercury motor with the after trade cost of the boat and trailer being \$15,443. The prisoner transport van has high mileage. After examination of the bids your Committee recommends it to be in the best interest of Sauk County to accept the bid of Fedderly Chrysler Dodge Jeep Inc of Reedsburg, Wisconsin for a 2024 Chrysler Pacifica with the after trade cost of the van being \$31,307. The fingerprint machine is running on an old operating system and cannot be upgraded. The cost of the fingerprint machine from a specialized unique vendor of HID Global Corporation is \$17,663. The 2024 Sheriff's Budget did not include funding for these assets; and American Rescue Plan Act Funds (ARPA) are available for these assets.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Sauk County Board of Supervisors, met in regular session, does hereby approve an amendment to the 2024 Budget to allocate \$64,413 for patrol/rescue boat, prisoner transport van and fingerprint machine funded by the ARPA grant.

Iowa County has withdrawn 9 from support and operation of the Tri-County Airport. The ordinances that govern the 10 operation of the airport need to be amended to reflect the withdrawal of lowa County. The 11 changes set forth below have been approved by the Federal Aviation Administration and 12 the Wisconsin Bureau of Aeronautics as part of the process to remove Iowa County from 13 14 any State and Federal obligations to the Tri County Airport. 15 16 NOW, THEREFORE, THE SAUK COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS DOES 17 **ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:** 18 19 Section 1. Any existing ordinances, codes, resolutions, or portions thereof in 20 conflict with this ordinance shall be and hereby are repealed as far as any conflict exists. Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect the day after passage and publication 21 22 as required by law. 23 Section 3. If any claims, provisions or portions of this ordinance are adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this 24 ordinance shall not be affected thereby. 25 Section 4. Sections 6.020 through 6.031 of the General Code of Sauk County, 26 Wisconsin, are amended as follows [additions noted by underline, deletions noted by 27 strikethrough): 28 29 SUBCHAPTER VI. AIRPORT OPERATION 30 31 32 Sec. 6.020. Authority and purpose. Pursuant to Wis. Stats. §§ 114.11 through 114.151, this subchapter is for the 33 purpose of establishing airport operation policies and land use within the boundaries of 34 35 the Tri-County Airport. 36 Sec. 6.021. Word usage. 37 For the purposes of this subchapter, certain words and terms are used as follows: 38 39 (1) Words used in the present tense include the future. (2) Words in the singular include the plural. 40 41 (3) Words in the plural include the singular. 42 (4) The word "shall" is mandatory and not permissive. 43 44 Sec. 6.022. Definitions.

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For the purposes of this subchapter, certain words and terms are defined as

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follows:

Airport means the Tri-County Airport located at E2525 County Road JJ, Spring Green, Wisconsin 53588.

Commission means the Tri-County Airport Commission as established by the owner, under Wis. Stats. § 114.14, which has jurisdiction for the construction, improvement, equipment, maintenance, and operation of the airport as set forth in Section 6.024.

Corporate hangar means a building housing one or more aircraft for the personal or business use of the hangar owner or lessee, and wherein no commercial activities are allowed.

Fixed-base operator means any person, firm, corporation, or association conducting any aeronautical business on the airport.

Hangar means a building designed or used primarily for the housing or storage of aircraft.

Manager means the person employed by the Commission as set forth in Section 6.024.

Multiple t-hangar means a building composed of partitioned, nested units designed to house no more than one aircraft in each unit and having single door openings for each unit.

Owner means Sauk, lowa, and Richland Counties.

Sec. 6.023. Land use.

In order to regulate the development and use of the airport, the airport shall keep and update an Airport Layout Plan, as required.

Sec. 6.024. Commission and Manager.

- (1) Commission organization.
 - (a) The Tri-County Airport Commission shall consist of seven members, six of whom shall be supervisors appointed by the chairperson of the Sauk, lewa, and Richland County Boards, two from each county four from Sauk County and two from Richland County, subject to approval of the respective county boards. The seventh member shall be a regular airport user when appointed.
 - (b) The terms of the county board supervisor members shall be determined by the county boards appointing each member. Upon approval of the Commission and the county boards of the owner, the airport user Commission member shall serve a term of three years.
 - (c) The compensation of the county board supervisor members shall be determined by the county boards appointing each member.
 - (d) The Commission shall elect one supervisor member to serve as chairperson and one supervisor member to serve as secretary. The secretary shall keep an accurate record of all Commission proceedings and transactions and shall provide minutes detailing those proceedings and transactions to the Sauk, lowa, and Richland County Clerks.
 - (e) Commission member votes shall be weighted as follows: Sauk County 24.5 percent each, lowa County 212.5 percent each, Richland County 212.5 percent each and airport user one percent.

- (f e) The airport user Commission member, subject to Commission guidance, shall actively promote and support the airport and communicate airport information with and from current and potential airport users and others.
- (2) Commission authority and duties. Subject to the limitations in Section 6.023(3) below:

- (a) The Commission shall have jurisdiction for the construction, improvement, equipment, maintenance, and operation of the airport.
- (b) The Commission shall recommend regulations and fees or charges for the use of the airport consistent with this ordinance. Such regulations, fees, and charges will be effective when approved by the owner.
- (c) Sauk County shall hire a Tri-County Airport Manager for the airport and set the compensation, benefits, expense reimbursements to be paid. The Airport Manager shall be a Sauk County employee. Sauk County, with assistance of the Commission, shall establish performance review standards for the Airport Manager and Sauk County shall conduct annual performance reviews of the Manager with input from the Commission. The Commission shall reimburse Sauk County for the salary, employee benefits, and expenses paid by Sauk County to or on behalf of the Manager.
- (d) The Commission may hire and fix the compensation of independent contractors as necessary, including an independent contractor to perform essential airport management functions during a temporary absence of the Airport Manager.
- (e) The Commission may contract with the United States, State of Wisconsin or other governmental and non-governmental entities when necessary to fulfill its responsibilities for the construction, improvement, equipment, maintenance, or operation of the airport.
- (f) The Commission, subject to approval of owner, may contract with private parties for a term not to exceed five years for the operation of the airport, including all necessary arrangements for the improvement, equipment, and successful operation of the airport.
- (g) The Commission shall procure and maintain in full force and effect insurance in forms and levels sufficient to protect the owner, the Commission, individual members of the Commission, airport employees and the airport from any liability arising from the operation of the airport.
- (h) The Commission shall, in cooperation with the Sauk County Accounting Department, establish an airport accounting system of sufficient detail to enable the Commission to accurately recommend rates and charges, eliminate inefficient operation and maintenance practices, and accomplish sound financial planning.
- (i) The Commission shall, in cooperation with the manager and Sauk County Accounting Department, prepare and submit an annual report to the owner. The report shall include current information on aircraft operations, based aircraft, airport expenditures and revenues, along with comparative figures for the past year, and projects for the coming year, and include other information deemed pertinent.
- (j) The Commission shall prepare and submit to the owner an annual budget setting forth anticipated revenues and expenditures, including capital improvements.

(k) The Commission shall prepare and submit for adoption by the owner an ordinance establishing minimum requirements for the conduct of aeronautical services on the airport and an ordinance regulating vehicle and pedestrian traffic on the airport. Current and future ordinances submitted by the Commission and approved by the owner are incorporated by reference and shall be deemed part of this Agreement as if set forth fully herein.

- The Commission shall approve and utilize standard leases and agreements for the various types of airport activities and land uses authorized in this ordinance.
- (m) The Commission shall make studies and conduct surveys as appropriate to assist in improving the operation of the airport. It shall cooperate with the Wisconsin Bureau of Aeronautics and the Federal Aviation Administration in airport and system planning functions and other activities.
- (n) The Commission shall cooperate with, and receive the cooperation of, all departments of the owner providing services or assistance to the airport.
- (o) The Sauk County Corporation Counsel shall serve as legal counsel for the Commission. The Commission may engage other non-legal professional services when necessary for the airport.
- (3) Limitations on Commission authority. The exercise of authority by the Commission under Section 6.024 above shall be subject to all of the following conditions:
 - (a) The Commission shall preserve public access and use of the airport and the public may in no case be deprived of equal and uniform use of the airport.
 - (b) The Commission is not a subunit of owner and no act, contract, lease, or any activity of the Commission shall be or become binding on or deemed an act of owner unless specifically authorized by owner, and then only to the extent specifically authorized.
 - (c) The Commission is a governmental body. The Commission and its members shall comply with all laws applicable to governmental bodies and public officials. No member of the Commission may vote on the question of his or her selection as manager nor on any question as to his or her compensation.
- (4) Manager authority and duties. The Airport Manager shall have the following authority and duties:
 - (a) The manager, under the supervision of the Commission, shall have the duty of administering and enforcing all airport ordinances, leases and agreements, and rules and regulations. The manager shall have authority to sign leases and other documents that have been approved by the Commission.
 - (b) The manager, under the supervision of the Commission, shall be responsible for day-to-day operations at the airport and shall have the authority to make Commission-budgeted expenditures of \$10,000.00 or less per item without further pre-authorization by the Commission.
 - (c) The manager shall meet with the Commission at the airport at least once each calendar quarter to inspect the airport facilities, review airport operations and financial matters, and discuss proposed airport development and other business.
 - (d) The manager shall provide a written report to the Sauk, Iowa, and Richland County Boards on no less than a quarterly basis.
 - (e) The manager shall, in cooperation with the Commission and the Sauk County Accounting Department, prepare and submit an annual report to the owner.

- The report shall include current information on aircraft operations, based aircraft, airport expenditures and revenues, along with comparative figures for the past year, and projects for the coming year, and include other information deemed pertinent.
 - (f) The Manager shall have such other duties and responsibilities as may be specified in the Airport Manager job description.

Sec. 6.025. Operation policies.

The Tri-County Airport Commission, in carrying out its duties and responsibilities, shall adhere to the following policies:

- (1) The Commission shall encourage the development of the airport, especially in those areas where substantial building costs are incurred by lessees, by approving long-term leases which provide for the reexamination and readjustment of rates and charges at specified periods of time during the term of the lease.
- (2) The Commission may provide utility service infrastructure up to a lessee's property line. The lessee shall bear such costs on his leased property.
- (3) No person shall engage in any business or commercial activity whatsoever on Tri-County Airport property unless specifically authorized in writing by the Commission. Lessees shall be selected on the basis of their qualifications, financial capabilities, and services offered; and not solely by bid basis. In determining the use of public building space, first consideration shall be given to public necessity and convenience. The Commission will provide the Wisconsin Bureau of Aeronautics with a complete copy of each current lease and agreement, if required by law.
- (4) Buildings to be constructed by lessees shall conform to all state and local building codes, and the building plans shall be subject to the approval of the Commission; Wisconsin Department of Industry, Labor, and Human Relations; Wisconsin Bureau of Aeronautics; and the Federal Aviation Administration.
- (5) Only the Airport Manager or designees thereof, with Commission authorization, may engage in the activity of storing, transporting, or dispensing of aviation fuels to the general public. Aircraft owners and operators may fuel their own aircraft.
- (6) Aircraft ground access to the airport property shall not be allowed, except from an approved Airport Industrial Park as depicted on the airport layout plan.
- (7) Tobacco smoking, e-cigarette use, alcohol consumption, and illegal use of drugs is prohibited on airport grounds. All persons shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and FAA statutes, rules, and regulations while on airport grounds.

Sec. 6.026. Ownership and funding.

- (1) Airport ownership. Subject to all other provisions pertaining to ownership interests contained within this section and Section 6.028, ownership interest in all airport assets shall be apportioned between the member counties as follows: Sauk County—49-65 percent, lowa County—25.5 percent, and Richland County—25.5 35 percent.
- (2) Airport funding.

- (a) County appropriations. All moneys appropriated for the construction, improvement, equipment, maintenance, or operation of the airport as managed by the Commission, or earned by the airport or made available for its construction, improvement, equipment, maintenance, or operation in any manner whatsoever, shall be deposited with the Treasurer of Sauk County, where it shall be kept in a special fund and paid out only on order of the Commission, drawn and signed by the secretary and countersigned by the chairperson of the Commission.
 - Annual operating expenses. The county board of each county owner shall appropriate on an annual basis the monetary amount requested by the Commission for annual operating expenses in the upcoming year in the following proportions: Sauk County 49 65 percent, lewa County 25.5 percent, and Richland County 25.5 35 percent.
 - 2. Capital expenditures. In addition to the appropriation for annual operating expenses, the county board of each member county shall appropriate on an annual basis the amount designated by the Commission for addition to the airport capital expenditure account in the upcoming year in the following proportions: Sauk County 49 70 percent, lowa County 25.5 percent, and Richland County 25.5 30 percent, which shall be reserved for future maintenance and construction projects exceeding \$5,000.00 in total cost and with a life expectancy of not less than five years.
- (b) Any private monetary contributions to the airport shall be applied to the airport capital expenditures account unless otherwise specifically designated by the contributor at the time the contribution is made.
- (c) Failure to fund. Failure of a county owner to fully fund the airport as required by paragraph 1 of this section shall be deemed a material breach of a member county's financial obligations to the airport. Upon such a breach, the non-breaching counties may, by resolution passed by the county boards of both non-breaching counties, expel the breaching member county from the airport. In the event of expulsion, the expelled county's assets in the airport shall be forfeited in equal shares to the remaining member counties. The expelled member county shall remain liable for all state or federal funds previously spent or committed to the airport on a cost-share basis.

Sec. 6.027. Cooperation.

Owner counties shall, in a timely and constructive manner, cooperate to resolve drainage and other issues related to but outside of the physical boundaries of the airport property that significantly impact the operation or viability of the airport.

Sec. 6.028. Notices.

The county clerks of the owner counties shall be the designated points of contact for any written notices or reports required under this ordinance.

Sec. 6.029. Withdrawal and dissolution.

(1) Withdrawal.

- (a) Authority for withdrawal. As permitted by Wis. Stats. § 114.151, the county board of any participating member county of the airport may by resolution withdraw from and relinquish its interest in the joint operation and control of the airport.
- (b) Procedure for withdrawal. If a member county wishes to withdraw from the airport, it shall provide written notice to each member county of its intent to do so by no later than July 1. Upon receipt of this notice, the other member counties will have 60 days in which to file a corresponding notice of intent to withdraw from the airport. Any withdrawal must be formalized by action of the withdrawing county's board by no later than October 1 in the calendar year notice of intent to withdraw is given, and the withdrawal shall have an effective date of January 1 of the next calendar year.
- (c) Rights and liabilities upon withdrawal. A withdrawing county shall remit by December 1 all unpaid appropriations for the calendar year in which notice of intent to withdraw is given. A withdrawing county shall remain liable for and shall remit timely payment of any appropriation obligation incurred prior to withdrawal for future airport projects but only for the amount obligated as of July 1. A withdrawing county shall relinquish all current and future interests in and claims related to the airport. The remaining member counties shall assume liability for all state or federal funds previously spent or committed to the airport on a cost-share basis.
- (d) Continued operations. In the event of withdrawal by a member county, membership of the withdrawing county on the Commission shall cease on the effective date of withdrawal. The airport shall not be dissolved upon the withdrawal of a single member county but shall continue to operate in accordance with the provisions of the Airport Operation Ordinance and any other ordinances adopted by the owner pertaining to operations at the airport, which shall be subject to revision, as necessary, with approval of the county boards of the remaining members of the airport.

(2) Dissolution.

- (a) Procedure for dissolution. The airport and Commission may be dissolved upon mutual agreement and resolution by the county board of all members of the airport or if the county boards of at least two either member countiesy resolves to withdraw from and relinquish their interest in the joint operation and control of the airport.
- (b) Action upon dissolution. Upon action triggering dissolution of the airport, a meeting of the Commission or its remaining members shall be called to determine whether the airport shall continue to operate, and if not, to adopt a plan for closure and liquidation.
 - 1. Continued operation upon dissolution. If a single member county chooses to continue operations at the airport, all assets and liabilities of the airport shall be transferred to that operating county, and the Commission shall be dissolved. Each withdrawing county shall remit by December 1 all unpaid appropriations for the calendar year in which dissolution occurs. Each withdrawing county also shall remain liable for any appropriation obligation incurred prior to withdrawal for future airport projects but only for the amount obligated as of July 1. The operating county shall assume liability for all state or federal funds previously spent or committed to the airport.

- 2. Closure of airport. In the event the decision is made to close the airport, notice shall be given to all tenants of the airport in accordance with the terms of their lease agreements. Upon closure, the assets of the airport shall first be used for the payment of debts and obligations of the airport. Remaining assets, if any, shall be distributed to the then-existing member counties of the airport in ratio to past contributions by each member. Unless otherwise agreed upon or dictated by contract, member counties at the time of dissolution shall share equally all outstanding liability for state or federal funds spent or committed to the airport prior to July 1, 2019 on a cost-share basis. Unless otherwise agreed upon or dictated by contract, member counties at the time of dissolution shall share all outstanding liability for state or federal funds spent or committed to the airport after June 30, 2019 on a cost-share basis in the following proportions: Sauk County — 49 65 percent, lowa — 25.5 percent, and Richland County — 25.5 35 percent.
 - (3) Cooperation required. In the event of withdrawal from or dissolution of the airport, all member counties agree to cooperate in the drafting and execution of any documentation necessary to effectuate the withdrawal or dissolution.

Sec. 6.030. Superseding effect.

Owner expressly intends, without reservation, this ordinance to supersede upon adoption any prior ordinance, agreement, or understanding of owner with respect to the matters addressed.

Sec. 6.031. Severability.

The several provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed severable, and it is expressly declared that the owner would have passed the other provisions of this ordinance, irrespective of whether or not one or more provisions may be declared invalid. And, if any provision of this ordinance or the application or circumstances is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance and the application shall not be affected.
