The meeting was called to order at 5:00 p.m. by Reinfeldt.

Reinfeldt asked for a motion to adopt the May 23, 2018 NFP Community Board Agenda. Kirchstein made a motion and Goeckermann seconded the motion. Motion carried unanimously.

Reinfeldt asked for a motion to adopt the January 18, 2018 NFP Community Board Minutes. Bjorklund made a motion and Maston seconded the motion. Motion carried unanimously.

Public comment: Mary from RAMC OB was present to represent Reedsburg since Jan Hasler could not be present. Hannah Hayes is a new public health nurse that will be working with the Prenatal Care Coordination program. Amy Luebke is present for her first NFP CAB Meeting to represent Early Headstart from Sauk and Columbia Counties.

Business Items for Discussion and/or Action:

A. Reinfeldt to welcome and introductions

1. Welcome and Participant Introductions:

- i. **Introduce new members:** Introduced Jessica Murray from SSM Health Dells, Janelle Krueger from Hope House, Amy Luebke from Early Headstart Sauk & Columbia County. Dr. Stacy Loerch from SSM Health Baraboo, Lora Dadam SSM Health Dells, Jan Hasler from RAMC OB, Joel Ludowitz from Sauk Prairie Police were mentioned but not present at this meeting.
- ii. **Program Updates:** Cathy was not present at meeting today due to meeting conflict but did apply for grant carryover funding for Betsy's NFP position to help with funding and was approved. Cathy continues to partner with Criminal Justice Coordinating Committee (CJCC) and Treatment Court. Betsy is building

- her caseload and has 9 of 22 clients so far. NFP started Safe Sleep CQI Project and team went to Waupaca for a 2 day training.
- iii. **Data:** The grant completed a site visit on 5/29-went well. Have served 85 families so far this grant period (since 10/1/17) and have had 21 graduations. Our data entry person was out having surgery so there has been some delays in data entries and reports Michelle has been able to run. Received 5 new referrals in March and 4 in April. Have 7 pending referrals. Data highlight: Measure 15-Percentage of primary caregivers without a HS degree or equivalent who subsequently enrolled in, maintained continuous enrollment in, or completed HS or equivalent has improved from 12.5% in 2016-2017 to 22.2% in 2017-2018 grant year.
 - iv. **Graduations:** 21 NFP babies have graduated after 2.5 years in the NFP Program so far. NFP had their 2nd Treatment Court graduation.
 - v. **Family Fun Day:** Discussed plans to schedule family fun day this fall. Want to include all caregivers. Sign up available for preparation, food, event day if interested. Kiana to create balloon archway, Betsy to manage fun photo booth. Will also have paint project and food.
 - vi. **Adverse Childhood Events (ACEs):** Michelle presented what ACE mean and the correlation between childhood trauma and risks to a person as an adult: early death, high-risk behaviors, cognitive impairment, disease, disability, etc. Janelle shared her knowledge on ACEs data collection in Sauk County since Sauk has a high percent of the population (>20%) who have 4 or more ACE points. This is more than any of the surrounding counties including Adams and Juneau. Providers discussed desire to receive ACE score on their patients if possible. Michelle concerned some providers won't know how to discuss this sensitive information with clients so Dr. Schad recommended each client be asked if they would like to share their ACE with providers and to have a cover letter that goes with each one. Discussed how symptoms of childhood trauma can look like ADHD symptoms when the child is at the doctor's office. Providers unsure what to do to help with trauma history.
 - vii. **Family Planning:** Ran out of time and not discussed.

Public Comment: New social worker, Amy Good, at Dean Baraboo Clinic. Dean Lake Delton Clinic is closing and providers are moving to the WI Dells location.
